MRDP Sunwater aims to supply solar water heating through black PVC pipe systems, allowing communities – and especially women and children – to save time and money. By reducing the need to gather firewood, the enterprise helps communities save trees and manage their natural resources sustainably.

BUSINESS MODEL

MRDP Sunwater promotes an efficient, easy-to-handle, low-maintenance passive water-heating system through various marketing channels. It also uses feedback on pilot systems from community members to identify potential entrepreneurs who can promote the concept.

In addition, MRDP provides support, training and assistance to these entrepreneurs, encouraging them to set up their own businesses. This includes providing practical exercises in business management, training in bookkeeping, technical training, planning and monitoring, and all other aspects of project-cycle management.

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Social impacts:

- Women and girls are usually responsible for collecting wood.
 They benefit enormously from the product as it gives them more free time to spend on other social and economic activities.
- Training is provided to women from the communities to help them advance in the public domain or workplace.

Environmental impacts:

- Local biodiversity and ecosystems are protected as fewer trees are cut down to heat water.
- Less firewood burned for water-heating purposes means less smoke pollution, which results in improved household air quality.
- Helping with community environmental education and awareness-raising helps reduce the use of firewood, which in turn leads to fewer GHG emissions.

Economic impacts:

- 150 households in two villages acquired a Sunwater system in the first year. Each is now spending significantly less on fuel for heating.
- The enterprise generates annual incomes of ZAR 5,000 for its employees.
- Monthly household spending on firewood can be reduced by up to ZAR 400.

The passive heating system is efficient, requires little maintenance and all the materials needed are locally available. The system pays for itself within three months.

Scaling up activities:

- Identify more entrepreneurs to promote and supply the system and help with training.
- Install approximately 50 additional systems to help with marketing and raise awareness of the concept.
- Carry out further research on possible improvements, such as rooftop installation.
- Further monitor the exact savings per household in terms of money value, time and number of trees saved.
